Technology Curriculum:

The MStM Technology Committee has spent the last two years writing, revising, and updating our MStM Curriculum. The committee consists of Josh Moser, Vivian Butcher, Jayne Sherwood, Amanda Skellenger, Rana Webster, Sara Kuhns, Tom Wood, Mike Crozier and me.

The MStM Technology Curriculum is based on the National Education Technology Standards for students. As foundational technology skills penetrate throughout our society, students will be expected to apply the basics in authentic, integrated ways to solve problems, complete projects, and creatively extend their abilities. The National Educational Technology Standards for students help to contribute to the social and civic fabric of their communities.

The new standards help identify several higher-order thinking skills and digital citizenship as critical for students to learn effectively for a lifetime and live productively in our emerging global society.

Teachers at MStM were trained periodically throughout the 2009-2010 school year on how to incorporate technology into their classrooms. We plan to continue this training during the 2010-2011 school year as well. The focus this year will be to again train teachers on how to incorporate technology into their specific content areas.

Teachers will be responsible for indicating on their lesson plans this next school year how they are using technology in their classrooms. These lessons will match up nicely with the student objectives they already have in their content area curriculum. They will use the Technology Curriculum as their guide for this instruction. The Technology Curriculum is located on our school's website under the Curriculum Link.

Technology is one of the components of the 21st Century Living Skills of the Iowa Core Curriculum. Infusing technology into all curriculum areas will:

- ❖ Improve student achievement, learning and engagement
- ❖ Develop student-centered classrooms as well as broadening learning beyond the classroom
- ❖ Prepare students for tomorrow's workplace and teach technology use and digital citizenship

- ❖ Allow teachers to more easily differentiate instruction to meet the needs of all students
- ❖ Open more opportunities for teachers and students to collaborate with other educators, students, and professionals throughout the world
- ❖ Level the technology playing field for all students

It is the goal of the MStM Technology Committee that we provide opportunities for our teachers to integrate technology into the educational experience in a way that prepares students for their futures. Along those lines, the MStM Board of Education has approved plans to upgrade the technology in our building. The funds to pay for this upgrade come from the penny sales tax money. The penny sales tax money can only be used, by law, for infrastructure and equipment purchases. More information in regard to this technology upgrade will be included in next month's newsletter.

Keep Kids Learning During the Summer

By forgetting about learning during the lazy days of summer, you're actually harming your child's education. Children lose a shocking amount of what they've already learned if they're allowed to "veg out" during the summer. That means that the kids who put forth just a little bit of effort are going to be way ahead come fall. You owe it to them—and to their futures—to incorporate learning activities into their summers.

• You've got to have "the talk."

Before the last school bell rings for the year, sit down with your children and let them know that reading and learning activities will be an important part of their summer. Assure them that they'll still have lots of time for play and relaxation.

• Find activity books to exercise their minds.

There is a huge variety of activity books available, usually catered to specific age groups. Give your children their own activity book, and let them work at their own pace to finish it. (Set a "due by" date to keep them on track.) Crossword puzzles, math activity books, and number puzzles all keep children's brains in motion.

• Set a reading time every day.

Set aside a certain time every day where everyone turns off the computer, TV, music, and video games, and spends 15 minutes or more reading. (As busy as parents are, it's important that you participate as well, even if you just read the newspaper.)

• Get great recommendations on books for your child.

Check out the American Library Association's lists on Summer Reading and Learning for Children at www.ala.org. Be sure to sign your kids up for library summer book clubs, too!

• Be "international."

Set aside one or two nights during the summer to have an international evening. Together, find recipes from a different nation and put together a special meal. Learn a few basic words in that country's language and find a children's book or an encyclopedia article that gives information on what life is like in that country. Get out a world map or a globe and show them where the country is and talk about what you'd want to visit if you could go there.

• Incorporate "thinking" into traveling.

If your family is able to take a vacation during the summer, include stops at a few places that sneak in learning, along with fun. Zoos, children's museums, and historic sites are educational as well as entertaining. For bonus learning, have your children help you plot out the trip using maps or an atlas. Older children can tally up the miles, keep track of expenses, or figure out gas mileage.

• Participate in sports/exercise.

With hours of free time every day, there's always time to build in some physical activity. Even if your child can't participate in a local sports league or community based team, there are plenty of ways to get exercise—from jumping rope to family walks. There are wonderful resources available through schools, libraries, and on the Internet to help families keep their children's brains "alive" during the dog days of summer. Even though it takes a little bit of effort on your part, the payoff, in terms of their education, is beyond measure.

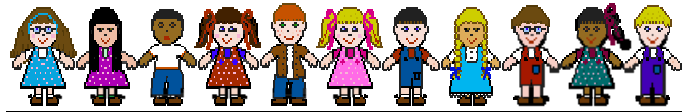

Counselor's Corner**

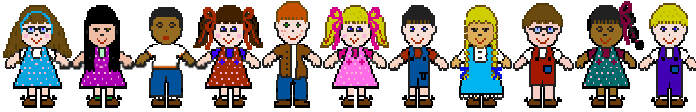

Since I deal with a lot of friendship issues here at school, I thought I would include some tips to help your child make and keep friends over the summer.

1. **Support extracurricular activities-** By joining clubs or teams, your child will meet others who share the same interests.
2. **Observe your child-** Does she have any behaviors that may be causing a problem? Is she too bossy or extremely shy? If so, help her to recognize the problem and develop alternative behaviors.
3. **Listen-** If your child is having problems making friends at school; listen to his concerns without jumping in immediately with solutions. Sometimes all he needs is a chance to talk.
4. **Problem-solve with your child-** If he needs more than a chance to talk, help him develop a plan. Ask him, "What do you think would happen if you sat beside the other boys at lunchtime?" Or, "What could you say? Then practice with him.

5. **Organize social events-** Birthday parties and sleepovers are a great way to cement blossoming friendships.

V. Old Business

A. Reports

1) Facilities Report – Supt. Peterson
 Supt. Peterson announced that the administration met with the Facilities Committee on April 7th and is recommending to the Board the following projects.

- 1) Softball Press Box/Concession Stand – repairs need to be made on this facility. The roof is in bad shape and the access to the press box is not safe. We will be working with Gehringer Construction and the cost will be approximately \$9,192. This money will come from the Penny Sales Tax money.
- 2) Lights at the Football/Track Facility – the lights that were donated to the district from Valley Stadium need to be upgraded. We are currently at risk of them blowing out. Since we will be hosting several track meets this spring including the State Regional Track meet, we want to be sure these are working properly. The cost will be approximately \$22,754. This money will come from the Penny Sales Tax money.
- 3) Heating issues – with the new air conditioning put in, we are now in need of upgrading our heating balance. We have parts of the building we can’t get heated well right now. The cost for this \$6,500. This money will come from the Penny Sales Tax money.

Supt. Peterson also informed the Board that the administration has met with a representative of Steve Bruere. He wants to work with us in getting the road paved by the football/track stadium. Lamar Koethe is interested in developing that land but would like help getting the utilities out there. Steve Grubb would like to develop the land north of our school facility. Steve Bruere has met with the City Council and they seemed receptive. Bruere thinks the county would be willing to work jointly with the school and the city to help get the infrastructure out there by the stadium which would help get the Koethe land developed.

L. Approve 2010-2011 Budget

The Board reviewed the published proposed budget with a tax levy of \$18.45137. The Board has had in-depth discussions at previous budget workshops for the reasons to raise it including the October 2009 10% across the board cut of \$248,479, eliminating Phase I funding of \$75,000, receiving 2% funding from the State but still being underfunded \$171,000, the end of the ARRA stimulus funding, enrollment unknowns, and our special education deficit. In the previous budget workshops they discussed the concerns of our economy and how the raise would affect the average person. They also considered that teacher salary negotiations were still in progress.

Gibson moved to be remembered that on this 12th day of April 2010, the Board of Directors of Martensdale St. Marys Community School District met in session for the purpose of a hearing upon the budget estimate as filed with the Board. There was found that the notice of the time and place of the hearing was in accordance to the *Code of Iowa* and as directed by the Board was published on the 24th day of March, 2010, in the *Record Herald & Indianola Tribune*. Thereafter and after hearing all taxpayers desiring to be heard, the Board took up the estimate for final consideration and determined that the said estimate be corrected and completed so that when completed it should be in words and figures as stated herein. The vote upon final adoption of the budget with a tax levy of \$18.45137 was seconded by Bunch. Roll call: 4 Ayes.

The Secretary was thereupon directed to forward the adopted budget and tax levy to the county auditor as provided by law.


