From the Desk of Ms. Peterson, Superintendent

The 10% Across the Board Cut for School District Budgets

As you have already heard, Governor Culver did announce that there is now in effect a 10% Across-the-Board Cut for School District Budgets. That 10% cut amounts to \$248,479 for the Martensdale-St. Marys Community School District. Last year school districts were cut 1.5% which totaled \$33,590 for the MStM School District. The Phase I dollars of the Education Excellence Fund were also cut late last year for school districts and this amounted to \$71,000 for MStM. So, the cuts for our school district total \$353,069.

Governor Culver has urged schools to spend down their Cash Reserves to offset this latest round of cuts. In the MStM School District, we have \$250,000 in Cash Reserve, but not all of this is available to offset the cut. That is why the Governor's comments are misleading.

The Cash Reserve Levy is a levy for the general fund of a school district. It allows the Board on its own motion to replace property tax revenue or state aid not received to eliminate severe cash flow problems or to avoid the expense of borrowing to meet cash flow purposes. The amount of the fund is determined by Board action annually. The Cash Reserve Levy is used to fund spending authority, but does not increase spending authority. There are two components of the Cash Reserve Levy: the regular cash reserve levy and the SBRC (School Budget Review Committee) Cash Reserve levy. The Regular Cash Reserve Levy is the method of replenishing the district's bank balance, for whatever reason the Board determines. The SBRC Cash Reserve Levy is used to fund the spending authority granted by the SBRC for whatever reason (most often a Special Education Deficit).

The MStM School District is using its Cash Reserve levy to offset the 1.5 percent cut from last school year, to offset the \$71,000 cut to the Phase I dollars, to fund our At Risk Program, and to offset our Special Education deficit. Because the per pupil funding for Special Education students has gone down in the past few years, many schools are now facing a Special Education deficit.

The MStM Board of Education has always tried to make sure that we have had cash balances to account for these types of things. We knew a cut from the State was coming but we never envisioned in our wildest dreams that it would be a 10%

cut. I will be working with our Board Members and our staff to develop a plan to address this cut to our budget. We are going to have to look at everything and make some decisions on how we are going to manage this year's budget and going forward as well. We will be discussing things we can do in the short term and then develop a plan for the next two to three years.

2008-2009 Annual Progress Report to the Community

According to Iowa Code, the Board of Education, with input from its School Improvement Advisory Committee (which is our Quality Support Committee), will adopt annual student improvement goals based on data from at least one district wide assessment. These goals are to describe desired annual increases in the curriculum areas of mathematics, reading and science for all students.

The MStM Annual Progress Report to the Community addresses these goals for our school district. A copy of this report is on our school's website. - Does my child show leadership abilities?
- What kinds of tests do you give? What do the tests show about my student's progress? How does my student handle taking tests?
- How does my child behave around adults? Is he/she polite and respectful?
- What do you consider my child's best strengths and interests?
- How can I help?
- If I need to reach you, what is the best way? (E-mail, phone, note.)

We are seeing a lot of absence in both the Elementary and the Jr/Sr High School. Symptoms have been widely varied, but most report a headache, sore throat, body aches, fever, and stomach aches. A lot of the students report feeling ill for several days, and then feeling better, only to get to school and feel sick again. We understand that it is hard to distinguish when it is the right time to send your children back to school.

Please do keep your student home if they have had a fever of greater than 100 degrees in the last 24 hours. If you have to use Tylenol or Ibuprofen to keep their temperature down they are not ready to come back.

Please continue to encourage your children to wash their hands frequently with soap and water or hand sanitizers, and to cover their coughs and sneezes.

In an attempt to keep doctor's offices and emergency rooms and their phone lines clear for necessary patients, we will be suspending the requirement for a doctor's note with extended illness. If you have a regularly scheduled dentist or doctor appointment, please continue to obtain notes for your child's absence.

From the Desk of Mr. Moser
High School English Language Arts Instructor

I am excited to begin my 10th year as an instructor in the Martensdale-St. Marys School District. This year I will be teaching a total of five courses: English II, American Ideas, Composition, and Creative Writing in the fall and Film Studies in the spring.

English II is a predominantly sophomore level class focusing on public speaking. Throughout the fall semester, students will deliver a total of seven speeches to their peers. Each speech assignment is designed to foster an understanding of a specific style of delivery (i.e. manuscript, extemporaneous, and impromptu), but students have a choice in the content of their speech. Their study of public speaking is accompanied by literary analysis and essential writing concepts throughout the year.

Students in American Ideas cover close to 300 years of American literature, spanning from the Puritans in the 1620s to the Moderns in the early 20th century. Using a variety of print and non-print texts, students explore the history, transformation, and important concepts of the American identity as seen through the prominent authors of each time period.

Composition is a college-track writing course created with the high school senior in mind. While the content focuses primarily on the technical aspects of academic writing (thesis statements, essay structure, citations, etc.), students also explore elements of academia that affect and complement their writing (i.e. digital information literacy, public speaking, and critical text analysis). While it is not a required course, Composition is recommended for any student who plans on pursuing post-secondary education.

The fall semester rounds out with Creative Writing, a course designed with the aspiring writer in mind. During the first quarter, students learn the basic elements of writing fiction from developing the main character to publishing the final draft. Depending on the depth of their study of fiction, students also learn various elements of poetry and poetic structure. The second quarter of the course is devoted to a single student project of considerable depth and length. For this assignment students design and execute a major work throughout the course of the quarter. In the past, these projects have ranged from novellas to poetry collections to full-length screenplays.

I welcome visitors to my classroom for any course on any day, and am looking forward to another great year at MStM!

Spectator Conduct Policy

I really hate discussing spectator conduct policy at our events. However, due to several incidents this fall, I want to reinforce that this school district is serious about the behavior of individuals at school events and won't tolerate the harassment of students, officials, or coaches. The following are several examples that are considered misbehavior warranting an individual's temporary or permanent removal from school activities.

- Abusive, verbal or physical conduct of spectators directed at participants, officials or sponsors of activities or at other spectators will not be tolerated.
- Verbal or physical conduct of spectators that interferes with the performance of students, officials or sponsors of activities will not be tolerated.
- The use of vulgar, obscene or demeaning expression directed at students, officials or sponsors participating in an extracurricular activity or at other spectators will not be tolerated.

If the individual/s either ignores the warning or the offense is so egregious to warrant immediate removal, the school district representative has the right to remove the individual for the premises at that point.

Please remember what high school athletics are all about. School sponsored or approved activities are an important part of the school program and offer students the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities not offered during the regular school day. Students sponsored or approved activities are provided for the enjoyment and opportunity for involvement they afford the students.

Spectators are permitted to attend school sponsored or approved activities only as guests of the school district, and, accordingly as a condition of such permission, they must comply with the school district's rules and policies. Spectators, like the students participants, are expected to display mature behavior and sportsmanship

From the Desk of Mr. Wood, Elementary Principal

Undesirable Behavior

Disrespectful, disruptive behavior that begins as early as kindergarten has become a very serious problem in many classrooms across the country. Schoolchildren who once

uttered “yes ma’am” are now openly challenging and defying teachers, “acting out” in class, and turning important instructional time into a battle for control. In a time when school districts are facing teacher shortages, bad behavior among children is driving teachers away from the classroom. While principals and teachers have roles to play in teaching proper behavior, parents should lead the way. Children learn what is and is not acceptable from their parents. It’s not an easy task, but without parental and home support, classroom disruptions will continue to increase.

Respect begins at home.

Make sure your children are raised to respect all adults. It may sound old-fashioned, but children need to know their “place.” As much as they would like to be, they are not the equals of their parents, teachers, or other adults.

Do not allow rudeness and disrespect.

Most children try to challenge the authority of adults. The ones who get away with it are the ones who become the most disruptive in school. Parents need to be firm and consistent from the very beginning. When a child is defiant or rude, he or she needs to face consequences, such as a “time out” or a loss of privileges.

“You can’t make me.”

We *never* advocate violent punishment like spanking or slapping. However, children need to know that parents and teachers do have authority that they must respect. Don’t allow your children to get into the “you can’t make me” mindset. Let them know what nonviolent punishments they will receive if they disobey you or their teachers. And follow through with the punishments every time they disobey, or they will soon realize you are not serious.

“Stop or I’ll sue.”

Some parents turn a deaf ear to the teacher’s point of view. Children and parents use the threat of a lawsuit as a weapon against teachers who are doing nothing more than trying to maintain or restore order in their classrooms. It is important that all children learn in a peaceful environment.

Communicate with the teacher.

Parents should set up a method of communicating with their children’s teachers. Send an e-mail or note to the teacher once a month, asking about your child’s academic strength or weaknesses, as well as about his or her social skills and behavior. If anything troubles you, set up a meeting as soon as possible.

Schedule a meeting.

If what the teacher is telling you about your child’s behavior differs a lot from what your child says, the best thing to do is to set up a meeting with all of you so that everyone gets the story straight. If there are serious problems, include the counselor and principal or assistant principal. The key is to do your best to keep your emotions and temper under control—getting angry at your child in front of the teacher or at the teacher in front of your child is no way to resolve the situation. By teaching your children to respect teachers and behave in

the classroom, you’ll be helping to create a better learning environment for your children and all of their classmates.

Ms. Burns’ and Ms. Dykstra’s class visited the Fire Station this month. Before we went to the fire station we talked about what to do if a fire starts, practicing STOP, DROP, and ROLL. We also learned what fire fighters do and about all of the gear that they wear and use.

When we got to the fire station, each student got to spray the hose! We learned about the “jaws of life” and we got to look at the inside of an ambulance. The preschoolers enjoyed reading books about fire safety and fire fighters and being able to see what they learned firsthand.

MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING
SEPTEMBER 14, 2009

The Board of Directors of the Martensdale-St. Marys Community School District met in regular session, pursuant to law, on September 14, 2009.

Members Present: A. Velvet VanHoose, President; Scott Anderson, Vice-President; Cathy Seymour, and Nicole Bunch, together with Superintendent Jean Peterson, and Business Manager Jill Gavin.

Members Absent: John Della Vedova

I. Welcome

VanHoose called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and welcomed all guests.

II. Consent Items

- A. Approval of the Minutes. Bunch requested an amendment to the August 10, 2009 minutes VI(D) to state that Bunch only approved Verwers' resignation for Jr. High football and not for him volunteering for the varsity football team.
- B. Approval of Agenda. VanHoose requested to move VI(M) to VI(B) so it could be discussed by the old Board before the new board was called to order.
- C. Approval of Bills and Secretary's Report. Bunch questioned the Pinnacle bill whether it included the change orders and Gavin informed the board that the bill that included the change orders was not suppose to be included and will be voided and a new check will be issued.
- D. Approval of Hot Lunch and Activity Reports. Bunch questioned the expense in the activity fund under the Share the Vision account. The administrative was uncertain of what the expense was and would update the board.

Bunch motioned to approve the move of the New Business item VI(M) to VI(B) prior to the old board adjourning seconded by Anderson. Roll call: 4 ayes.
