Dr. Robert Newsum will begin service as superintendent for the Martensdale St. Marys Community School District on Monday, November 1, 2010.

Bob and his wife, Linda, currently reside in Chariton, where she is the Chariton secondary alternative education teacher. Their family includes two daughters, Keara, who is completing on-line coursework and will receive her bachelor's degree in business, from Buena Vista, and Katelynn, who graduated from Iowa State University and is currently working as a youth counselor for Lutheran Services of Iowa, in Ames. Dr. Newsum earned his bachelor's degree in art education and master's degree in secondary educational administration, from the University of Northern Iowa, and his doctorate in educational administration, from Iowa State University.

Bob retired from full-time administration after serving for six years as superintendent in Chariton. His previous administrative positions included three years as superintendent for Rudd-Rockford-Marble Rock; one year as part-time superintendent at Mormon Trail; twelve years as junior high/middle school principal in Indianola; and three years as middle school principal and curriculum director, in Spirit Lake. Most recently Dr. Newsum worked as a consultant for the area education agency, in Creston, with responsibility for the Iowa Core Curriculum training. Bob began his educational career as a middle school art teacher, in Newton.

Although he doesn't officially begin work until November 1, Bob has visited the district several times, has met many of the teachers and other staff members, has attended some district activities, and is eager and excited to serve as your superintendent. On behalf of the district and himself, Bob expresses his thanks and appreciation to Dr. Jim Verlengia, Heartland Area Education Agency administrator, for his leadership, guidance, and service as interim superintendent for the Martensdale St. Marys Community School District during the past several months.

- What is my child's ability level? Does he/she comfortably work at that level?
- Is my student in different classes or groups for different subjects? Which ones? How are the groups determined?
- How is my child's behavior?

- Does my child participate in class activities?
- Does my child show leadership abilities?
- What kinds of tests do you give? What do the tests show about my student's progress? How does my student handle taking tests?
- How does my child behave around adults? Is he/she polite and respectful?
- What do you consider my child's best strengths and interests?
- How can I help?
- If I need to reach you, what is the best way? (E-mail, phone, note.)

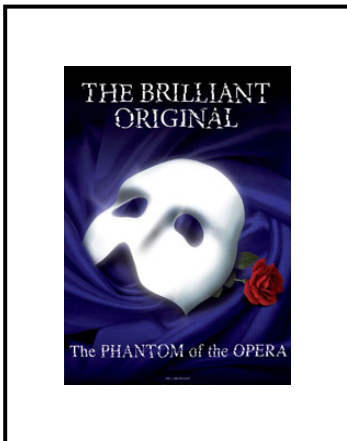
IMPORTANT YEARBOOK ANNOUNCEMENT FOR PARENTS

Verbal Abuse—Slurs and Name-calling

It is far easier for teachers, parents, and playground supervisors to spot physical harassment than it is for them to notice something that can be just as damaging—slurs and name-calling. In reality, the phrase "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me" has little merit. Words truly can hit as hard as a fist, and unkind labels can follow children throughout their school years.

Don't allow labels in your home.

Forbidding your children to use curse words is important, but it isn't enough. You also need to make sure they're not using ethnic, racial, religious, or sexual orientation slurs. Explain that using labels like these is insensitive and prevents them from seeing the person as an individual.

Talk about the cruelty some words convey.

The phrase "That's so gay" has become a common slur among young children, although many don't understand the cruelty that is behind these words. Help children understand the pain that slurs and name-calling can cause.

Explain that being "different" isn't justification for being harassed.

Although children have always picked on peers who didn't seem to fit in, today the abuse has become bolder and, in some cases, led to deadly beatings. Other children, long-term targets of bullies, have turned to violence—or even suicide—in a form of sick revenge. It is simply not acceptable for families or schools to allow the harassment of children for any reason at all.

Talk with them about false impressions.

A girl who would rather play sports than play with dolls is not boyish or a lesbian; she's just a girl who would rather play sports. The same is true for boys who may not enjoy rough-and-tumble activities. Calling children names like "gay boy"

or “queer” just because they choose to follow their own interests is an ignorant choice and cannot be allowed.

Help them understand when words are okay, and when they’re not.

Some children may feel that it’s okay to use a slur if they’ve heard it over and over from others. Help them understand the difference between a word that is being used as a put-down and a word that is simply a description.

Use non-judgmental terms.

Saying “my uncle is gay” (if he is) is simply a statement of fact. Calling classmates “gay” or “queer” simply to be hurtful is just as unacceptable as those old ethnic and racial slurs that have long been forbidden. Pay close attention to how your children—and their friends—are behaving toward others and talk with them about how it would feel if they were the targets of name-calling.

The fifth graders have had a busy start to their new school year. Their days have been filled with computer skills, outdoor exploration, learning to become good readers and

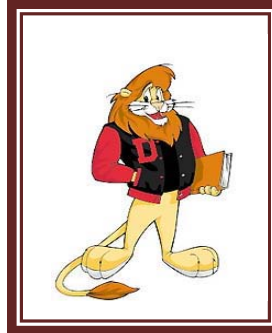

The 6th grade students have kicked off the 2nd quarter in the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) program. It is a highly acclaimed program that gives kids the skills they need to avoid involvement in drugs, gangs, and violence. D.A.R.E. is led by Deputy Randy Spurr. He conducts a series of classroom lessons that teaches children how to resist peer pressure and live a productive drug and violence-free life.



6th grade students have started working on number theory in preparation for computing with fractions. They will work with the concepts of greatest common factor, least common multiple as they find equivalent fractions, simplify fractions, convert mixed numbers and improper fractions, and express them in simplest form. In class, students will be using a variety of technology from Unitedstreaming videos to PowerPoints.

The 6th grade uses the Prentice Hall textbook which has additional benefits for the students. Students can practice an online quiz or test on www.PHSchool.com by simply typing in the web code located in the textbook at random places. The back of the textbook has answers to some homework problems. If there is any additional help that you feel you need, please contact me for further resources.

5th grade students are starting a unit on data and graphing. Students will be working with the mean, median, and mode. I will encourage the students to use calculators of some of these lessons so if they need to remember it for school. Students will also analyze and create graphs using appropriate scales.

MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING
SEPTEMBER 13, 2010

The Board of Directors of the Martensdale-St. Marys Community School District met in regular session, pursuant to law, on September 13, 2010.

Members Present: Scott Anderson, President; Nicole Bunch, Vice President; Dave Shutt, Wade Gibson, and Amy Harper; together with Mike Crozier, Tom Wood, Interim Superintendent Jim Verlengia and Business Manager Jill Gavin.

Members Absent: None

- I. Welcome
Anderson called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. and welcomed all guests.
- II. Consent Items
 - A. Approval of Minutes Board President
 - B. Approval of Agenda Board President
 - C. Approval of Bills and Secretary's Report Board President
 - D. Approval of Hot Lunch and Activity Reports Board President

Gavin provided a couple of changes to the August 9, 2010 minutes. Shutt motioned to approve the consent items seconded by Harper. Roll call: 5 ayes.

- III. Celebrations
Crozier, Wood and Verlengia stated that it has been a very smooth start and credited a lot of people for the success of the new school year.
- IV. Public Comments - none
- V. Old Business

A. Reports

1) Facilities Report

Verlengia has met with Jim Lynch and the high school gym is functioning but still needs to be aware of possible concerns. A meeting will be scheduled with the Facilities Committee as soon as possible. Gibson asked about the turf on the field that the rubber is piling up in the end zones and it needs to be groomed. Bunch inquired about the flags that need to be replaced. Crozier stated that the US Flag has been replaced. The MStM flag cannot be replaced because the crank on the pole is not working. Shutt asked about the signs that were on the bleachers last year at the football field to keep the kids off of them. Crozier will need to get new ones.

2) MStM Music Booster Minutes - There were no minutes from the Music Boosters. The Board wanted to thank the new band instructor for getting the band out on the football field. Crozier received many compliments about the marching band.

3) MStM Athletic Booster Minutes – Minutes were provided from the August 12th meeting. Gibson requested a correction in the minutes that the school did not help purchase the State Champion Baseball rings for the team players.

4) MStM PTO Minutes – Minutes were provided from the August 31st meeting.

B. Presentations

1) Principal's Report Tom Wood

Wood announced his goal for the school year will be to bring in teachers and students to the board meetings to show the Board what the teachers are learning during professional development and how students are responding. Wood introduced Kelly Johnson, PTO Treasurer. Kelly informed the Board that this is her 4th year in the PTO and that this year they asked for more input and involvement from the teachers. In the past, the PTO has provided funds for elementary field trips, 3 book fairs, cookie dough fundraisers, Scrapfest Day, Junior Achievement, and the Elementary Fun Run. This year they have raised enough funds to provide a document camera for each classroom. Future fundraising will be used to purchase projectors in each classroom. PTO Officers are Marti Myer, President; Sara Franey, Vice President; Kelly Johnson, Treasurer; and Andrea Miller, Secretary.

The Board thanked Kelly for her presentation.

Wood introduced Melissa Schad, 1st Grade Teacher, and Dianne Reynolds, 4th Grade Teacher. They presented to the Board literacy initiatives that included the Daily 5 – Student Driven Management Structure Designed to Fully Engage Students in Reading and Writing. Tom invited the Board Members and anyone who would like to see this in action to come visit the classrooms anytime. The Board thanked Melissa and Dianne for the presentation.

2) Principal's Report Mike Crozier

Crozier provided the participation numbers for all the Fall Activities. He announced the Leadership Team that included Angela Davidson, Steve Goodale, Josh Moser and Justin Herrick. He informed the Board that the district met all the goals for the Annual Yearly Progress Report. He stated that the 1:1 laptop initiative was the most positive thing in education for our kids. The kids are using them and the teachers are able to provide effective training with them. We have had a few broken screens but the problems are lessening.

3) Curriculum Director's Report Josh Moser

Josh Moser reviewed with the Board about the District Annual Progress Report, CSIP, the 2010-2011 Professional Development Calendar for Elementary and Secondary, and the Curriculum needs Planning Guide. He was at a recent Iowa Core Curriculum meeting with several other schools and they were very impressed with our program and requested additional information from us. We received good compliments from other 4A schools that wanted to stay connected with MStM. The Board thanked Josh for his presentation.

4) Superintendent's Report Jim Verlengia

Verlengia made the Board aware that the District received a grievance from an employee and it has gone through Level 1, 2 and 3. The employee has chosen to pass Level 4; which is going before the Board and will instead go straight to arbitration. Verlengia has been in contact with our legal consul. Verlengia will keep the Board updated.

Verlengia updated the Board on the upcoming Head Count date of October 1, 2010. We have a projection that are numbers are down again from last year. The projection also states that we have 86 open enrollment out students and 87 open enrollment in students. He encouraged the Board that we need to determine why these families are choosing to go elsewhere and what we can do to convince them to come back to our District.

VI. New Business

The September Board meeting is considered the organizational meeting for the new school year. Verlengia requested nominations for President and Vice President for Fiscal Year 2011. Anderson nominated Nicole Bunch for President. No other nominations were received. Shutt 2nd the nomination for Nicole Bunch. Roll call: 5 ayes.

Bunch nominated Scott Anderson for Vice President. Anderson nominated Dave Shutt for Vice President. No other nominations were received. Gibson motioned to close the nominations seconded by Shutt. Roll call: 5 ayes.

Roll Call was made for Vice President: Anderson voted for Shutt. Bunch voted for Shutt. Harper voted for Anderson. Gibson voted for Shutt. Shutt voted for Shutt. Dave Shutt received 4 votes. Anderson received 1 vote. Dave Shutt will be the Vice President.

The insurance would be paid for from the Management Fund; which would free up expenses from the General Fund and the PPEL Fund. Verlengia has set up an appointment with Infomax to request a release from our maintenance agreement. Gavin provided what our current balance is in the Management Fund and that retirement funds and unemployment costs are also taken out of the fund along with paying our property insurance. Gavin explained that we may have to adjust our Management Fund when we start working on the FY12 budget. Harper motioned to table the decision in accepting the School Equipment Insurance until we hear back on the decision from Infomax seconded by Anderson. Roll call: 5 ayes.



Members Present: Scott Anderson, President; Amy Harper, Dave Shutt; together with Superintendent Jim Verlengia and Business Manager Jill Gavin.


Members Absent: Nicole Bunch and Wade Gibson
